Nursing education and research have largely focused on direct, bedside care, but emergency nurses also play a critical role in organizing department resources and patient care trajectories. Our ability to manage patient flow impacts both patient safety and staff wellbeing. Patient flow management includes the work of prioritizing patients, rationing and allocating resources, and managing a balance between the speed and comprehensiveness of care. At our level one trauma center, a successful feasibility study was performed to determine if nurses could be taught to locate the amniotic sac and calculate the FHR using the M-Mode on the bedside ultrasound. Having ultrasound guided intravenous catheter insertion background was determined to be beneficial to learn the practice. 					Nurses are an integral part of the healthcare system. Global disasters that occur daily can have local impacts as the populations harmed are displaced and ultimately enter US healthcare systems which are largely unprepared to provide care in a compassionate and cohesive manner. 					Triage is hard. Emergency nurses must quickly assess patient severity and prioritize care for critical patients, as well as monitor less acute patients that are waiting for care in the lobby. Patient acuity today makes resource-driven criteria less helpful. It is rare that patients need zero or one resource, which leaves the majority of patients in the "at least ESI 3" category.  Accuracy at triage is critical, yet according to the ENA website, triage nurses (even the most experienced) are approximately only 60% accurate with their ESI assignment. Triage decisions are often influenced by several other competing priorities.  A multitude of factors, including RN experience, level of training, as well as human and institutional biases can result in inappropriate triage assignments.  While assigning an ESI 4 instead of ESI 5 isn't lifethreatening, the same cannot be said for incorrectly assigning ESI 3,2 or 1.  These discrepancies present as under-triage, which puts patients at risk; and over-triage, which causes delays in needed care as well as inappropriate use of resources. In all of the United States' public health, pregnancy-related mortality has the widest and most persistent racial and ethnic inequality. Alarming is the fact that African-American women have a 3 to 4-fold greater risk of maternal mortality than women of other ethnic or racial groups. Cardiomyopathy is the leading cause of maternal mortality with cardiovascular disease accounting for one-third of all pregnancy-related deaths. Terrorizing is the fact that only a small fraction of these women had a known diagnosis of heart disease prior to death.
